Godly Play... Spoken Here!

A child arrives. An adult seated in a low chair in the doorway, says, "Good Morning" with a welcoming smile and invites the child to join the circle of children. In the center are some wooden figures and a piece of colored felt. The person telling the story picks up a small figure and shows it to the listening children saying, "This is the Christ Child. He is holding out his arms to give you a hug."

This is what a child experiences in a Sunday school where Godly Play is "spoken." Godly Play feels more like worship than it does like school. Godly Play is a discovery model of learning that allows children to experience God in a rich learning environment using beautiful materials to share stories from the bible and to describe the Liturgy of the Church. The children then interact with the materials of the story using all of their senses and the result is that they are able to deeply enter into the reality of God.

Godly Play uses the Montessori methodology of teaching to engage the child and guide the child to a deeper understanding of God. The curriculum was designed over four decades by Jerome Berryman, an Episcopal priest and is known the world over. He has written numerous articles and books. *Godly Play, An Imaginative Approach to Religious Education; 1991, Augsburg* is an introduction to Godly Play, his life work.

Vacation Bible School at

St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, Homestead

St. Matthew's opened its doors to the children of the Homestead community for its annual VBS, August 5 thru 9 from 4:30 to 8:30. Our theme was "Hip-hop Hope – Jesus Makes Me Glad" published by Abington Press and was very appropriate for our children.

Day 1: Glad to Worship: The people of God rejoice when the foundation of the temple is laid. (Ezra 3:10-13).

Day 2: Glad to Give Thanks: The psalmist gives thanks all day long because he sees God working in every situation (Psalm 92:1-4).

Day 3: Glad Teachings: Jesus teaches that true happiness comes from God, even in the midst of hopelessness (Matthew 5:3-12).

Day 4: Glad for Salvation: Zacchaeus was happy to return stolen money, welcome Jesus and receive salvation (Luke 19:1-10).

Day 5: Always Glad: Paul challenges people to be joyful by focusing on excellence (Philippians 4:4-9)

The 23 children who attended were between the ages of 4 and 12 years-old and were divided into three age groups for instruction: 4-6, 7-9. 10-12. Each day included a lesson, a craft, music and dance, games, prayer and dinner. Hugs

were the order of each day both for the children and from the children. At the end of each day, each child went home with a sack breakfast and lunch for the following day. Crafts included: tie-dye shirts, prayer and praise boxes, VBS bracelets with each colored bead having a meaning, i.e., God created the earth and the trees (green), Jesus blood was shed for us (red)., VBS magnets and "I Luv VBS" "stained" glass windows. On Friday, the final day, the children were given a "string-bag type" backpack filled with school supplies – pencils, markers, tablets, crayons, pens, glue sticks, scissors, etc. Their smiles upon receiving them made our hearts glad.

We were staffed by eight women and three teens/college students from our small congregation. In addition I had five teen volunteers from my Bethel Park High School Forensic Team (speech and debate).

We at St. Matthew's have always had a heart for children. "But Jesus called them unto him, and said, 'Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God." (KJV" Luke 18:16). With our children's ministry to the neighborhood we believe that this is one way of the many ways that we are committed to our mission statement: Bridging the gaps in our community and beyond as we celebrate Jesus, who has bridged the ultimate gap, by living in right relationship with:

God, by looking up; Ourselves, by looking in; and Our neighbor, by looking out..

VBS is only one of several activities or events that we have throughout the year for them. Future activities are in the works: a Halloween party and a "Happy Birthday, Baby Jesus" party. Both of these were popular with the children last year.

As a side note: While the children are the focus of these ministries, the families are happy to have their children attend as we provide a safe, healthy, and happy environment for their children. Since a part of our teaching also includes promoting simple hygiene habits as well as learning about nutrition and healthy eating, we feel that we are also benefitting the entire families.

Pumpkin Dip

1 can (15 oz.) of pumpkin

1 box (5 oz.) of vanilla instant pudding

1 small container of Cool Whip

1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

Mix pumpkin, pumpkin pie spice, and pudding mix. Fold in Cool Whip. Chill. Serve with graham crackers, vanilla wafers or apple slices.

Sugar-free pudding and "lite" cool whip can be used.
