
Interfaith Prayer Service at Trinity Cathedral

Diocesan Transitions August 2018

Effective May 9, 2018, **the Rev. William Ogburn** has transferred his canonical residency from the Diocese of Pittsburgh to the Diocese of New York, where he is serving as Associate Rector of the Church of St. Luke in the Fields in the West Village neighborhood of Manhattan.



The Rev. Doug Kinsey has been named Assisting Priest of Nativity, Crafton, and Pastor of St. Matthew's Evangelical Lutheran Church (ELCA), Crafton.

The Rev. Brandon Mozingo has been named Deacon-in-Charge of St. Stephen's, McKeesport, effective July 1, 2018. He was previously serving at Trinity Cathedral, where he and Jessica Hauth were married on June 3, 2018.

The Board of Directors of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary voted at their annual meeting in May to elect **the Rev. Nancy Chalfant-Walker** to serve as a Board Member. She is a 2002 graduate of the seminary, and serves as Rector of St. Stephen's, Wilkinsburg.

Bishop McConnell has appointed **the Rev. Natalie Hall** as ecumenical and interreligious officer for the Diocese of Pittsburgh, to serve a three-year term ending in December 2020.

While serving as a Deputy from the Diocese of Pittsburgh to the General Convention of The Episcopal Church, **Mr. Michael Braxton** was elected to the Board of Trustees of General Seminary in New York City. Mr. Braxton, a member of Calvary, East Liberty, has served on the diocesan Constitution and Canons Committee and was also a Deputy to General Convention in 2015.

The Rev. Huett Fleming retired as Rector of Good Shepherd, Hazelwood, on April 30, 2018, having served there since 1998. Fr. Fleming previously served as Interim Rector at St. Stephen's, McKeesport.

Exploring ways to know and serve God and God's people, together

Discerning lay leaders from the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh will meet regularly to:

- Grow together in Christian faith, practice, and leadership.
- Develop skills and vision for ministry to support clergy and members of their parish.

- Discern interest and sense of call to serve as licensed Lay Reader, Eucharistic Minister, Eucharistic Visitor, Preacher, or Evangelist (in any combination!).
- Connect with others from a variety of contexts to cultivate opportunities for creative ministry development.

Bishop Dorsey McConnell anticipates that the Love. Teach. Heal. Leadership Academy will:

- Spark vision, creativity, and connections for ministry among the laypeople of the diocese.
- Encourage laypeople to recognize their own authority and call for ministry in their congregation and community by virtue of their baptism.
- Meet the real, regular, practical ministry needs of our parishes now and in the future.
- Create a roster of trusted lay leaders throughout the diocese who may be called on for ministry and leadership needs as they emerge.

When and Where

Participants will meet for two hours every other week at one of four Diocese of Pittsburgh locations, including one by video conference. Meetings will include a devotional practice for further daily use at home, Bible study, and group conversation regarding themes. Participants will receive a copy of *Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices* by Scott Gunn and Melody Wilson Shobe and a binder with any additional instructional and reading materials. Participants are expected to bring a copy of the Book of Common Prayer and Bible (NRSV translation) in which they can mark with notes.

How to Participate

The names of people interested in the **Love**. **Teach**. **Heal**. **Leadership Academy** can be submitted by congregations, clergy, diocesan staff, or individuals themselves through **September 30, 2018**. Nominees will be contacted by Canon for Faith Formation and Evangelism Natalie Hall and asked to submit a brief information form and endorsement from their parish clergy and congregation. ECW Fall 2018 Scholarships Available

The ECW established the Memorial Membership Fund to aid students with educational grants. The fund was begun in 1927 to be used for two missionary training scholarships. In the 91 years of its existence, the scope of the fund has widened to include nursing, theology and other humanitarian fields of study.



Funds are raised through gifts from individuals or groups in memory of a loved one or friend. This money is invested and the interest used for the granting purposes.

Each applicant must:

- be an Episcopalian in good standing (active) in a parish in the Diocese of Pittsburgh,
- · have completed one year of college or the equivalent,
- be pursuing education in either church or humanitarian related fields,
- · submit an application, including a letter stating goals and need, and
- submit a reference letter from their parish priest.

The Memorial Membership Committee will consider each request based on individual need and circumstances. Scholarships are completely unencumbered and may be used as needed to aid the recipient in achieving their educational goals. Each eligible applicant is able to apply once a year for three years.



St. Paul's Pilgrimage to the Holy Land

St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon, will be participating in a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, leaving Pittsburgh on February 7, 2019 and returning via Tel Aviv on February 19.

The tour will be guided by Qumri Pilgrimages, operated by Iyad Qumri, former Canon to the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles. Mr. Qumri has guided tours in the Holy Land, where he was born, and where he has raised his family, for 20 years. For a

The cost of the trip is estimated at \$3,600 for people sleeping two per room and \$4,150 for single occupancy rooms. This includes tours, lodging, meals while there, tip to tour agency, airfare and travel insurance. We will be staying at hotels in Jerusalem and Nazareth during this pilgrimage.

We will begin meeting as a group in September. If you are considering attending, please check your passport and make sure it will be valid through September 2019.

Chatterton

Based on the book by Peter Ackroyd
Directed by Karla Boos

A new play adapted from Sir Peter Ackroyd's award-winning book and directed by Quantum Theatre founder Karla Boos, *Chatterton* spreads out in three dimensions, immersing its mobile audiences in the haunting spaces of Trinity Cathedral Pittsburgh.

Chatterton's plot takes inspiration from historical character Thomas Chatterton, the Romantic era's most famous suicide, an 18th century poet who took his young life and was immortalized 100 years later by a very famous painting. Modeling for that painting was Victorian poet George Meredith, whose own dramatic life also features in Ackroyd's story. And in the present, poet Charles Wychwood goes on a hunt to solve mysterious puzzles from the past - is what we believe about Thomas Chatterton truth or fiction?

Chatterton offers a trifecta of poets in three centuries, colorful London with Dickensian characters bristling with humor, and deep debates on what is real, what is fake, asking is anything 'authentic' in the intertwining worlds of art and commerce?

In the manner of Quantum's 2014 production TAMARA, the audience moves through masterfully dressed spaces in a stunning historic landmark. The experience begins with pre-show drinks in Pittsburgh's oldest churchyard and includes a full intermission dinner by the celebrity chef of the week.

Nominations for 2018 Convention Elections Open

The Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh is now welcoming nominations of clergy and lay persons for election to membership on various governing bodies and committees of the Diocese.

This year, three lay persons will be elected to the Board of Trustees. One clergy and one lay person will be elected to the Standing Committee, the Cathedral Chapter and the Committee on Constitution and Canons. One clergy and two lay persons will be elected to the Disciplinary Board. Finally, one person (clergy or lay) will be elected to the Commission on Ministry and Diocesan Growth Fund.

Multiple candidates for open positions are accepted and encouraged. All positions carry a term of three years, except for the Standing Committee which has a four-year term. Nomination forms have been mailed to all of the parishes in the Diocese, and are also <u>available here</u>.
