Court Approves Property Agreement

A final legal requirement has been met for an agreement between the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh and nine congregations that chose to leave the Episcopal Church a decade ago.

The agreement affirms the congregations' ownership and continued use of church properties to which they hold legal title, while also preserving the historic trust interest held by the Episcopal Diocese in those properties. It further establishes mechanisms for an on-going relationship between the diocese and the parishes. All parties involved described it as a "distinctively Christian compromise."



The agreement was first announced on February 28, 2018, subject to the necessary court and civil administrative approvals. These have now been granted.

On December 4, 2018, Judge Joseph James of the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas approved the agreement as jointly requested by the diocese and the individual parishes. Previously, the Pennsylvania Attorney General's office stated that it had no objection in light of laws governing non-profit organizations in the Commonwealth.

With the court's action, the agreement takes effect immediately.

Social Justice & Outreach Committee Climate Resolution Passed at Convention

We have all noticed increased climate disruption such as hotter summers and more severe hurricane, flood, and fire damage.

Recently the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change released a report saying that even more far-reaching changes than previously recommended are necessary to keep our planet livable.

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has designated creation care along with racial reconciliation and evangelism as one of the three major priorities of the Episcopal Church. The Diocesan Convention unanimously <u>passed</u> <u>Resolution 2</u>, written by Tom Slater of Calvary and proposed by the Social Justice and Outreach Committee (SJO).

Free Naloxone in Brentwood, McKeesport

Stop Overdoses in PA: Get Help Now Week is a statewide initiative to distribute naloxone and get help for residents suffering from the disease of opioid-use disorder.

Naloxone (also known by brand names Narcan® and Evzio®) is the medication historically used in hospitals and ambulances to reverse opioid overdose and keep people alive. Opioids are pain medications (like Vicodin, OxyContin, morphine, methadone, fentanyl, Percocet, Opana) and heroin.

Naloxone is only effective for opioid overdoses. It cannot reverse an overdose from alcohol, benzodiazepines, cocaine, or other drugs if opioids are not present. But since most overdose deaths involve opioids, it is an important rescue medication.

Naloxone is very safe. Giving naloxone to someone who has not taken opioids will not harm them, so it is routinely used whenever overdose is suspected.

On Thursday, December 13, from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., naloxone will be available for free to any Pennsylvanian at nearly 80 locations across the state.

St. Peter's in Brentwood and St. Stephen's in McKessport are distribution centers for this program.
