Special Guest Speaker: Father Paul Abernathy


We are thrilled to be welcoming Father Paul Abernathy as our special guest speaker this year. Father Abernathy is pastor of St. Moses Orthodox Christian Mission in Pittsburgh's Hill District and director of FOCUS Pittsburgh, a non-profit specializing in Trauma-Informed Community Development. Since its inception in 2011, FOCUS Pittsburgh has distributed millions of dollars in food, clothing, furniture, transportation assistance, and emergency relief to the greater Pittsburgh community. The group's Backpack Feeding Program distributes food to 2,500 children every weekend during the school year. Father Abernathy is also CEO of the FOCUS Pittsburgh Free Health Center, which offers free primary, behavioral health, and dental care to

the area's uninsured and underinsured. Father Abernathy and his ministry were recently featured in the <u>Pittsburgh Post-Gazette</u>.

Garden Grants Available Again this Spring

Spring is coming! We know this to be true, because seed catalogs have been showing up in our mailboxes, and our weekly church bulletin is starting to advertise fish fry events!

Once again in 2019, the diocesan Social Justice and Outreach (SJO) Committee will offer grants to fund garden initiatives. For the last five years, these grants have been offered to support the efforts of creating and sustaining parish-based vegetable gardens.

This year we have contributions to support garden grants from St. Paul's (Mount Lebanon), Calvary (East Liberty), and Christ Church (North Hills) outreach commissions to supplement the SJO annual budget. The grants are primarily designed for ministries within the diocese and with the goal of even distribution across all districts. It is hoped that these small grants will enable the continuation of existing ministries on the local level. However, the ECW will continue its policy of also awarding grants to some national and international ministries such as Episcopal Relief & Development.

Funds are raised through gifts from individuals or groups in memory of a loved one or friend. This money is invested and the interest used for the granting purposes. Each applicant must:


- be an Episcopalian in good standing (active) in a parish in the Diocese of Pittsburgh,
- have completed one year of college or the equivalent,
- be pursuing education in either church or humanitarian related fields,
- submit an application, including a letter stating goals and need, and
- submit a reference letter from their parish priest.

The Memorial Membership Committee will consider each request based on individual need and circumstances. Scholarships are completely unencumbered and may be used as needed to aid the recipient in achieving their educational goals. Each eligible applicant is able to apply once a year for three years.

Parishes are reminded that Parochial Reports for the year 2018 are due by March 1, 2019, and the Episcopal Church's online filing system is now open.

A blank report form, filing instructions, and detailed workbooks for help in completing each page of the report are available online at www.episcopalchurch.org/research/forms-and-instructions

Parishes are highly encouraged to file using the online reporting system. Information about how to access this system was mailed to every parish in December. For those who file electronically, a signed paper copy is also required to be submitted to the diocesan office. If you cannot access the online system, submit your completed and signed paper copies to the diocesan office for entry into the system.

It is the joint responsibility of clergy and vestry to assure the timely completion of parochial reports.


