Special Guest Speaker: Father Paul Abernathy

We are thrilled to be welcoming Father Paul Abernathy as our special guest speaker this year. Father Abernathy is pastor of St. Moses Orthodox Christian Mission in Pittsburgh's Hill District and director of FOCUS Pittsburgh, a non-profit specializing in Trauma-Informed Community Development. Since its inception in 2011, FOCUS Pittsburgh has distributed millions of dollars in food, clothing, furniture. transportation assistance, and emergency relief to the greater Pittsburgh community. The group's Backpack Feeding Program distributes food to 2,500 children every weekend during the school year. Father Abernathy is also CEO of the FOCUS Pittsburgh Free Health Center, which offers free primary, behavioral health, and dental care to

the area's uninsured and underinsured. Father Abernathy and his ministry were recently featured in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette.

Anglican/Episcopal Studies Introduced at PTS

A program to prepare Episcopal priests, deacons, and lay leaders for ministry - together, in the same setting - has been formally inaugurated at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

The new Anglican/Episcopal Studies Track was celebrated at a Service of Evensong at the seminary on February 28. Bishop McConnell presided and preached.

The course of studies covers church history, doctrine, liturgy, and practical theology. It also offers preparation in areas specifically required for ordination. All Episcopal students take part in the diocese's Love+Teach+Heal Leadership Academy.

The formal partnership with PTS through this curriculum has been a long-standing desire of Bishop McConnell, who sees it a means of ending the separate and uneven levels of ministry preparation traditionally provided to the orders of clergy and laity.

"PTS offers academic excellence and a rich ecumenical environment, which could benefit the larger Episcopal Church," said the bishop. Already several other dioceses have approved the PTS track for their students.

SJO Film Screening in Squirrel Hill

On Monday, March 25, at 7 p.m., the diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee (SJO) will present the documentary film *Plastic Paradise: The Great Pacific Garbage Patch.*

The film provides an opportunity to learn why so many people are now trying to reduce dependence on plastic, continuing our diocese's concern.

It will be screened at the <u>Episcopal Church of</u> the Redeemer, located at 5700 Forbes Ave., Pittsburgh 15217.



Elise Yoder, climate activist and co-founder of What's SUP Plastic Challenge Pittsburgh 2019, will give our discussion context and share current local efforts to reduce plastic consumption and production.

This film is free and open to the public, and parking is available at the church. The event is sponsored by the Social Justice and Outreach Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh in collaboration with other members of the ecumenical group *What's SUP* (Single Use Plastics), and the Church of the Redeemer.

Diocese Sells Donegal Property

On February 25, 2019, the Diocese of Pittsburgh completed the sale of real estate it owned in Donegal, Pennsylvania. The property included 160 acres of land, a guesthouse, and a barn. It was sold to a family with young children for \$730,000.

The rights to coal, as well as oil, gas, and others minerals on the property, were included in the sale under terms that allow the diocese to retain 75% of future royalties and bonus payments on those assets, should the new owners choose to sell these rights.



The sale was authorized by the diocesan Board of Trustees, who are pleased that the price reflects a fair market value. Prior to offering the property, the trustees determined that the guesthouse was under-utilized and that the once-envisioned development of the site into a conference or youth center was no longer in the strategic interest of the diocese.

As with the sale of other surplus properties, the trustees will set aside the proceeds for future diocesan needs that are consistent with the mission of The Episcopal Church.

The sale did not include a smaller parcel of land and house known as the Bishop's Lodge, which the diocese continues to own. Under a life estate agreement dating back to when he was an Episcopal bishop, Robert and Nara Duncan may live there for as long as they desire. The diocese and the Duncans continue to honor that arrangement.






Beginning Wednesday, March 20, Trinity Cathedral will present a noon lunchtime series "Loving Our Enemies."

Garden Grants Available Again this Spring

Once again in 2019, the diocesan Social Justice and Outreach (SJO) Committee will offer grants to fund garden initiatives. For the last five years, these grants have been offered to support the efforts of creating and sustaining parish-based vegetable gardens.

This year we have contributions to support garden grants from St. Paul's (Mount Lebanon), Calvary (East Liberty), and Christ Church (North Hills) outreach commissions to supplement the



Come join fellow Episcopalians from across the diocese at our volunteer workday at the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. We'll be working in the Repack







In the past we've had very rewarding experiences repacking food ranging from cereals to oranges. The Food Bank is always well organized and makes excellent use of our volunteer time.

ECW Spring 2019 Scholarship Application Available, Due April 18

The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) established the Memorial Membership Fund to aid students with educational grants. The fund was begun in 1927 to be used for two missionary training scholarships. In the 92 years of its existence, the scope of the fund has widened to include nursing, theology and other humanitarian fields of study.



Funds are raised through gifts from individuals or groups in memory of a loved one or friend. This money is invested and the interest used for the granting purposes. Each applicant must:


- be an Episcopalian in good standing (active) in a parish in the Diocese of Pittsburgh,
- have completed one year of college or the equivalent,
- be pursuing education in either church or humanitarian related fields,
- submit an application, including a letter stating goals and need, and
- submit a reference letter from their parish priest.

The Memorial Membership Committee will consider each request based on individual need and circumstances. Scholarships are completely unencumbered and may be used as needed to aid the recipient in achieving their educational goals. Each eligible applicant is able to apply once a year for three years.
