Keeping Children Safe - A Reminder

With the beginning of Sunday School and other programs for children and young people, please remember the importance of child abuse prevention.

As Christians, we are called to care for and protect children, and to create a community where all are safe. Abuse of children and youth in congregations, institutions, agencies, or programs of the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh is wrong and will not be tolerated.

All who minister in the Diocese of Pittsburgh, lay and ordained, volunteer and paid, are entrusted with the care of God's people, and are responsible for preserving that trust.



Some important steps for keeping children safe include:

Screening

A consistent application and screening process for volunteers is essential. A standard written application, including references, must be completed. An interview and reference checks should be done. These procedures can be simple, but should be thorough and be the same for everyone.

Background Checks

All volunteers and employees who have contact with children are required to complete background checks as specified in Pennsylvania state law. These include a child abuse clearance, a Pennsylvania criminal record check, and an FBI fingerprint background check for anyone who has not lived in Pennsylvania for the past ten years consecutively. Training

The Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh provides no cost training for child abuse prevention through the Church Pension Fund's Safeguarding program. This online training can be completed anywhere there is high speed internet access. The short, focused courses can be completed in 30-45 minutes. Supervision of Programs

It is crucial to monitor and supervise programs for children and youth, implementing guidelines for keeping participants safe as outlined in Diocesan policies.

Overdose Awareness Day at Trinity Cathedral

432 people lost their lives from drug overdoses in Allegheny County in 2018.

On Overdose Awareness Day, **Friday, August 30,** we will remember them, we will pray for those who still struggle with addiction, and we will educate ourselves to work to end the overdose epidemic.



The day includes continuing education for addiction specialists starting at 9 a.m., a free training for the public in the use of Narcan to reverse overdoses at 11 a.m., and a prayer service at noon led by members of the Pittsburgh Downtown Ministerium, Christian Associates of Southwest PA, interfaith colleagues, and Coalition for Leadership, Education and Advocacy in Recovery (CLEAR) members.

A cathedral bell will ring once for every person who died from an overdose in Allegheny County in 2018.

Weather permitting, the prayer service at noon will be held in front of Trinity Cathedral.

Pittsburgh Will Not Forget U families will display pictures on the cathedral grounds of loved ones who died from overdoses.

Education for Ministry

EfM (Education for Ministry) started in 1975 when the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee) decided to develop a curriculum which would provide a basic theological education to lay Christians.



EfM is a distance learning course in which the members of the group meet each week to discuss reading materials which provide a basic education about Christianity and contemporary theological issues.

It is a four-year program, but students commit to only one year at a time. The first year is devoted to reading and understanding the Old Testament; second, the New Testament; third the history of the Christian Church; fourth, contemporary theological issues. The group also engages in a theological discussion on a topic of their choosing for part of the session.

Discussions are led by trained mentors who act as moderators and fellow seekers.

There are three groups in the Diocese of Pittsburgh-- two at Calvary in Shadyside and one at St. Paul's in Mt. Lebanon-- which are currently recruiting new participants. Members of the groups can be from various parishes as well as other denominations.

The Calvary groups meet Wednesdays from 6-9 p.m. and Thursdays from 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.. The cost of the program is \$375 a year and includes all textbooks. For more information on the program in general, please visit <a href="http://efm.sewanee.edu/about-efm/about-

Parish Audit Reports Due September 1

All parishes are reminded that the completed Parish Audit Reports are due in the diocesan office by September 1, 2019.

Diocesan Canon XVII, Section 5 states:

All reports of such audits, including any memorandum issued by the auditors or audit committee regarding internal controls or other accounting matters, together with a summary of action taken or proposed to be taken to correct deficiencies or implement recommendations contained in any such memorandum, shall be filed with the Bishop or Ecclesiastical



Authority not later than 30 days following the date of such report, and in no event, **not later than September 1** of each year covering the financial report of the previous calendar year.
