## Overdose Awareness Day at Trinity Cathedral

432 people lost their lives from drug overdoses in Allegheny County in 2018.

On Overdose Awareness Day, **Friday**, **August 30**, we will remember them, we will pray for those who still struggle with addiction, and we will educate ourselves to work to end the overdose epidemic.

The day includes continuing education for addiction specialists starting at 9 a.m., a free training for the public in the use of Narcan to reverse overdoses at 11 a.m., and a prayer service at noon led by members of the Pittsburgh Downtown Ministerium, Christian Associates of Southwest PA, interfaith colleagues, and Coalition

for Leadership, Education and Advocacy in Recovery (CLEAR) members.

A cathedral bell will ring once for every person who died from an overdose in Allegheny County in 2018.

Weather permitting, the prayer service at noon will be held in front of Trinity Cathedral.

Pittsburgh Will Not Forget U families will display pictures on the cathedral grounds of loved ones who died from overdoses.

## **Diocesan Transitions for August 2019**

**The Rt. Rev. Kenneth L. Price Jr.** is serving as our Assisting Bishop during Bishop McConnell's sabbatical until November 3, 2019. Bishop Price previously served as our Bishop Provisional from 2009 until 2012.

**Ann McStay** of St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon, was elected president of the Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Pittsburgh on May 4, at the Spring ECW meeting.

**The Rev. Jude Bell**, a monk of St. Gregory's Abbey, an Episcopal Benedictine monastery in Three Rivers, Michigan, died on June 11, 2019. Fr. Bell previously served at Church of the Advent in Jeanette.

## World War II Hymns by Ralph Vaughan Williams



The Book of Job, in which the man who has all this world offers loses everything but his faith in God, is one of the most elusive books in the Old Testament.


A series of paintings by 18th century artist and visionary William Blake, inspired by the book, provides a unique way of entering its mysterious world, showing the vision of Christ at its heart.








### **Healing Communities Training**

At a time when one out of every 28 Pennsylvanians are under criminal justice system control, whether in prison, jail, on probation or parole, it is likely that every congregation has members impacted by crime or the criminal justice system.

Shame and stigma often isolate those affected, preventing them from seeking help. How can congregations create a culture of safety and support for those who need it?



Our diocesan convention <u>passed a resolution</u> last November to support development of a diocesan *Healing Communities* training with the Pennsylvania Council of Churches.

A training workshop is scheduled for **Saturday, October 5, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.**, at <u>Church of the Holy Cross</u> in Homewood, 7507 Kelly Street, Pittsburgh PA 15208.



The *Healing Communities* training, a proven national model, equips congregations to become stations of hope by building relationships of healing, redemption, and reconciliation. <u>Here is a link</u> that describes the results of this training workshop in powerful detail.

Congregations are encouraged to send a group of at least three leaders/active members in order to effectively implement the model in their setting. Although the usual cost of \$25, it will be free for Episcopalians. It is open to all, and no one will be excluded for inability to pay.

The training will be given by the Rev. Sandra Strauss, Director of Advocacy and Ecumenical Outreach for the <u>PA Council of Churches</u>.

## **Education for Ministry**

EfM (Education for Ministry) started in 1975 when the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee) decided to develop a curriculum which would provide a basic theological education to lay Christians.



EfM is a distance learning course in which the members of the group meet each week to discuss reading materials which provide a basic education about Christianity and contemporary theological issues.

It is a four-year program, but students commit to only one year at a time. The first year is devoted to reading and understanding the Old Testament; second, the New Testament; third the history of the Christian Church; fourth, contemporary theological issues. The group also engages in a theological discussion on a topic of their choosing for part of the session.

Discussions are led by trained mentors who act as moderators and fellow seekers.

There are three groups in the Diocese of Pittsburgh-- two at Calvary in Shadyside and one at St. Paul's in Mt. Lebanon-- which are currently recruiting new participants. Members of the groups can be from various parishes as well as other denominations.

The Calvary groups meet Wednesdays from 6-9 p.m. and Thursdays from 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.. The cost of the program is \$375 a year and includes all textbooks. ## Tree of Life to hold High Holiday services at Calvary Episcopal Church

In the heart of Mr. Rogers' real life neighborhood, church exemplifies what it means to be a good neighbor.

Mr. Rogers would be kvelling.



Calvary Episcopal Church, a paragon of good neighborliness, will serve as host to Tree of Life\*Or L'Simcha Congregation for all of its 5780 High Holiday services.

Calvary is located on Shady Avenue, less than a mile from the Tree of Life synagogue building, in the heart of Mr. Rogers' neighborhood. On Saturday, Oct. 27, the church happened to be filled with parishioners attending its annual fundraiser to help the underserved. The news of the mass shooting targeting people down the street hit them hard, said the Rev. Jonathon Jensen, rector.

"So, right afterward, the next day, I preached about the shooting and what that might mean, short-term and long-term, and how does a person of faith respond," Jensen said.

"In my experience, I have found that often what happens is people will say, 'Is there anything we can do to help you?' and it puts the burden on the person who's hurt," he said. "I've found it is much more helpful to make specific offers of things people might actually need, so the burden is on you to do it rather than the person who is hurting to think of something for you to do."

Jensen recently had been counseling a parishioner on this topic, and "I thought this is just a bigger and more awful situation," he said.

Calvary decided to make a specific offer to TOL\*OLS. In a card signed by members of the church, they offered to "share space with you for anything you need because you won't likely have yours for a while," Jensen said. They sent the card along with money collected over the next two weeks to TOL\*OLS.

Jensen knew it was unlikely that the grieving congregation would read the card immediately because of the sheer volume of mail it would be receiving, as well as being forced to address countless other necessary and more pressing tasks in the aftermath of the attack.

"I didn't hear a thing for months, and then one day I got an email that said, 'Hey I'm from Tree, and we'd like to talk to you about possibly using space for High Holidays," said Jensen.




