A Message from Bishop Price

Dear Friends in Christ,

Soon after I arrived back in Pittsburgh, Marianne Novy, the chair of our Diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee, contacted me with information about our participation in the *Healing Communities Training for Clergy and Congregations* being sponsored by the Pennsylvania Council of Churches on October 5 at the Church of the Holy Cross in Homewood. She explained that this event is in direct response to a resolution passed by our Diocesan Convention. Since we are a sponsor of the training, Episcopalians attending will not have to pay the registration fee. Further details are provided in the article below.



Given the reality of our world today, I believe this timely workshop is of vital importance. Unfortunately, it is not unusual for our

congregations to experience instances in which a member, volunteer, employee, family member, or friend ends up involved with the justice system. As Christians we want to do all we can to offer support while not compromising our need to make sure our congregation is a safe place. I believe this workshop will provide tools to help us know how to reach out to people by showing Christian compassion, while at the same time ensuring our congregations are safe.

I encourage our congregations to make sure they are represented at this training. Our Presiding Bishop has called upon us all to be Jesus people. Hanging on a cross of crucifixion, Jesus still was able to reach out to the thieves around him. It is doubtful any of us will find ourselves hanging on a cross, but that does not mean that we will not encounter people who find themselves affected by the justice system. Hopefully, this workshop will provide information to help us better minister to them.

This is what being a Jesus person is all about.


At a time when one out of every 28 Pennsylvanians are under criminal justice system control, whether in prison, jail, on probation or parole, it is likely that every congregation has members impacted by crime or the criminal justice system.

Shame and stigma often isolate those affected, preventing them from seeking help. How can congregations create a culture of safety and support for those who need it?

Our diocesan convention <u>passed a resolution</u> last November to support development of a diocesan *Healing Communities* training with the Pennsylvania Council of Churches.

A training workshop is scheduled for **Saturday**, **October 5**, **9 a.m. to 4 p.m.**, at <u>Church of the Holy Cross</u> in Homewood, 7507 Kelly Street, Pittsburgh PA 15208.

The *Healing Communities* training, a proven national model, equips congregations to become stations of hope by building relationships of healing, redemption, and reconciliation. <u>Here is a link</u> that describes the results of this training workshop in powerful detail.



Congregations are encouraged to send a group of at least three leaders/active members in order to effectively implement the model in their setting. **Although the usual cost of \$25**, **it will be free for Episcopalians**. It is open to all, and no one will be excluded for inability to pay.

The training will be given by the Rev. Sandra Strauss, Director of Advocacy and Ecumenical Outreach for the <u>PA Council of Churches</u>.

Bring your lunch, coffee, and a friend and enjoy six weeks of wonderful music at our Cathedral!





ECW Fall 2019 Grant Applications Available

The Diocese of Pittsburgh's Episcopal Church Women (ECW) will be making outreach grants in the Fall.





The grants are primarily designed for ministries within the diocese and with the goal of even distribution across all districts. It is hoped that these small grants will enable the continuation of existing ministries on the local level. However, the ECW will continue its policy of also awarding grants to some national and international ministries such as Episcopal Relief & Development.

ECW Fall 2019 Scholarships Available

The Episcopal Church Women established the Memorial Membership Fund to aid students with educational grants. The fund was begun in 1927 to be used for two missionary training scholarships. In the 92 years of its existence, the scope of the fund has widened to include nursing, theology and other humanitarian fields of study.



Funds are raised through gifts from individuals or groups in memory of a loved one or friend. This money is invested and the interest used for the granting purposes.

Each applicant must:

- be an Episcopalian in good standing (active) in a parish in the Diocese of Pittsburgh,
- · have completed one year of college or the equivalent,
- be pursuing education in either church or humanitarian related fields.
- · submit an application, including a letter stating goals and need, and
- submit a reference letter from their parish priest.

The Memorial Membership Committee will consider each request based on individual need and circumstances. Scholarships are completely unencumbered and may be used as needed to aid the recipient in achieving their educational goals. Each eligible applicant is able to apply once a year for three years.



For fifty years, the interfaith organization <u>Church World Service</u> has sponsored *CROP Hunger Walks* to raise funds and awareness to combat hunger here at home and around the world.

The diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee invites all Episcopalians to join their neighbors to help provide food, water, and partnership in development for those in need. Some contribute by walking, others by sponsoring a walker or their community walk as a whole.



In our area, walks are scheduled in Elizabeth-Forward on September 29; Greensburg on October 6; the East End, South Hills, Penn-Trafford, Murrysville, and Indiana, all on October 13; and Ligonier on October 20.

The East End walk, starting at 2 p.m. on Saturday, October 13, begins and ends at South Avenue United Methodist Church at 733 South Avenue in Wilkinsburg with a six mile route to Squirrel Hill and back. A shorter one-mile route is also planned.

Education for Ministry

EfM (Education for Ministry) started in 1975 when the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee) decided to develop a curriculum which would provide a basic theological education to lay Christians.



EfM is a distance learning course in which the members of the group meet each week to discuss reading materials which provide a basic education about Christianity and contemporary theological issues.

It is a four-year program, but students commit to only one year at a time. The first year is devoted to reading and understanding the Old Testament; second, the New Testament; third the history of the Christian Church; fourth, contemporary theological issues. The group also engages in a theological discussion on a topic of their choosing for part of the session.

Discussions are led by trained mentors who act as moderators and fellow seekers.

There are three groups in the Diocese of Pittsburgh-- two at Calvary in Shadyside and one at St. Paul's in Mt. Lebanon-- which are currently recruiting new participants. Members of the groups can be from various parishes as well as other denominations.

The Calvary groups meet Wednesdays from 6-9 p.m. and Thursdays from 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.. The cost of the program is \$375 a year and includes all textbooks. For more information on the program in general, please visit http://efm.sewanee.edu/about-efm/about-efm.

Emphasis on general housekeeping; room set-ups and breakdowns as scheduled; assist in general maintenance of grounds; building security; additional duties as needed.


