MLK Holiday Gun Buy Back Day



In partnership with the City of Pittsburgh Police Department, Police Chief Scott Schubert, the Episcopal Lutheran Alliance, and Homewood Ministries, the Church of the Holy Cross will sponsor a community non-violence gun buy back event on **Martin Luther King Day, January 20, 2020 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.**

"Be the King: Annual Gun Buy Back Day - Practicing Non-Violence is Priceless" event will feature music, refreshments and the buy back of firearms up to \$100 per gun surrendered - **no questions asked!**

The event takes place on the day we pause to honor the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. - "the Apostle of Non-Violence." Because of its historic role in community engagement and outreach, Holy Cross became a logical and highly visible site for this event. "This Gun Buy Back project recognizes that Black Americans are disproportionately the victims of gun violence - more than 85% of black homicide victims are shot and killed by guns. It is imperative that the church be on the front line of caring for and protecting our community," said Reverend Torrey Johnson, the Priest-in-Charge at Holy Cross.

Holy Cross recently was the site of a double homicide that occurred only feet from the doors of the church. Minister Guy Brown, Holy Cross' Outreach Coordinator who is organizing the gun buy initiative at Holy Cross said, "We witnessed the aftermath and impact of the homicide the of two victims right here on the corner of Kelly and Collier streets, the very intersection on which the Church of the Holy Cross sits. Had the episode occurred later in the morning, church members and particularly young children could have been caught in a cross fire. We must do what ever we can to reduce gun violence, and perhaps save a life or two."

Officers from the Pittsburgh Police Department will be on-site at Holy Cross to supervise and manage the gun buy back event.

Holy Cross Church is raising the funds necessary to cover the cost of the buyback and is accepting donations online through the Episcopal Lutheran Alliance at https://elallianceinc.org/donate, or by checks mailed to the church.








Read a Book for Lent: *Beloved,* by Toni Morrison

For Lent this year, the **Commission on Race and Reconciliation**(CORR) is remembering author Toni Morrison, who died last August at the age of 88. She was the first African-American woman to win the Nobel Prize in Literature for her writing and was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Obama in 2012.

Her work is "a prose so precise, so faithful to speech and so charged with pain and wonder that the novel becomes poetry," said John Leonard, former Executive Editor of the New York Times Book Review.

Established in 1936, Sheldon Calvary Camp (SCC) is located on the scenic shores of Lake Erie in Conneaut, Ohio. SCC is a summer camp for children ages 7-16 and families. Our staff is composed of young adults ages 17 and older, an experienced supervisory team and camp directors. Many of our staff members are former campers who want to share their experiences with others.

Coed Camp and Stars & Stripes - These are week long sessions for boys and girls ages 8-16 offering a full recreational camping experience. Campers spend days engaged in activities such as swimming instruction, fine arts, tennis, athletics, archery, and experiential education. Nine campers of similar ages live together in each cabin under the guidance and supervision of two counselors. Each day ends with campfire or chapel.

Day Camp - This program runs from 9am-4pm daily for boys and girls ages 7-12 during the 4th of July week. Campers participate in small group activities including swimming, games, crafts, and nature!

Ready, Set, Camp! - This 4-day, 3-night program is geared toward younger campers ages 7-12. It offers the same activities of Coed Camp but is designed for children and parents who may be apprehensive about a whole week away from home or challenged to fit in a full week of camp into their summer schedules. Campers can explore and enjoy the complete camping experience, just for a shorter period of time!

New Zealand Night Prayer Community Common Prayer Service

As part of their Community Common Prayer Series, St. Mark's Episcopal Church, 335 Locust Street, in downtown Johnstown is offering a "New Zealand Night Prayer" service at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, January 19.

The offering of prayer in the evening, often called Compline, has sometimes been described as the 'goodnight prayer of the Church'. It rounds off the day and prepares us for a quiet night. As the psalmist wrote:



I lie down in peace and take rest my rest for it is in God alone that I dwell unafraid.

"Night Prayer" is the order of Compline from *A New Zealand Prayer Book*, the common prayer book for the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia. They, along with The Episcopal Church, are members of the worldwide Anglican Communion.

Free refreshments and conversation will be available following the service. All are welcome.



Engage in the 2020 U.S. Census!

2020 is way more than an election year! The Episcopal Church is an official partner for the 2020 Census with the U.S. Census Bureau! Watch Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry's video below explaining why the U.S. census is important and why you should get involved.



As an official partner, The Episcopal Church can help make the census count as accurate as possible. 132 federal programs plus private businesses, state, and local initiatives <u>depend on census</u> <u>data</u> for effective distribution of resources, while congressional seats are apportioned according to the census count.

Religious denominations and institutions are well-placed to reach historically hard-to-count populations, a critical goal of the Census Bureau. Research shows that someone is more likely to take the census if they hear about it from someone they trust.
