When Nothing Else Could Help, Love Lifted Me

Dear Beloved,

We have entered Holy Week and are turning our attention to the cross, Christ's crucifixion, and ultimately His triumphant victory over death in his resurrection. Once a year, we remember this amazing event that happened over two thousand years ago. We recognize that Jesus is unconditional love, and before we can get to the victory cry of Easter, we must mourn what happened the prior Friday morning. We mourn that hate lifted love up on the cross.



Hate is alive today. We wait with fear and trembling as the George Floyd case begins. Black America in particular is bracing itself for yet another moment of hate to go unpunished and injustice to be upheld in the courts. Will that be the case this time? Many are finding it hard to embrace a hope that can vision a day when America declares that black lives finally matter.

We see, and must not quickly forget, that hate claims all people, and the hate of racism has recently claimed the lives of several Asians unto death. Xiaojie Tan, Daoyou Feng, Delaina Ashley Yaun, Paul Andre Michels, Soon C. Park, Hyun J. Grant, Suncha Kim, and Yong A. Yue, are the names of those who lost their life during the massacre in Atlanta. Since the pandemic, Asians are experiencing increased violence in America. How has America responded, and how will it respond? Will Asian American victims of hate find justice in America? How will the church respond? How should we respond?

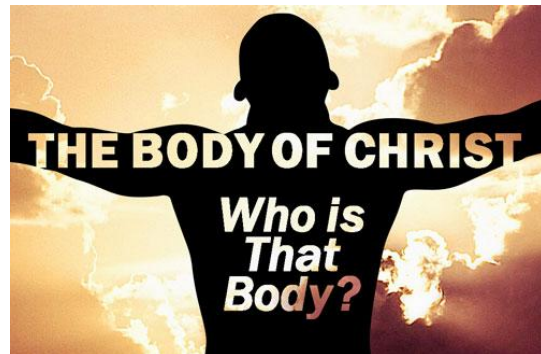
A note from Bishop McConnell:

At the beginning of this Holy Week, I ask us all to be joined in prayer and action, to do everything we can to lift up the vision of the Beloved Neighbor embodied in Christ Jesus our Lord, that we might truly become the Beloved Community.

The Body of Christ: Who is that body?

Join the Rev. Canon Eric McIntosh and the Rev. Canon Natalie Hall for a diocesan-wide Eastertide conversation about the content of two important documentaries: *The Black Church: This is Our Story, This is Our Song* (<https://www.pbs.org/show/black-church/>) and *A Time for Burning* (<https://bit.ly/3rogS43>).



Black expressions of the Christian church developed largely from nationally encouraged racial segregation. It has been noted that Sunday morning in America is the most “segregated hour,” where black, brown, and white bodies meet for worship in separate spaces. Where will these faithful expressions of Christianity meet? Let’s watch these critically acclaimed documentaries to enter a conversation about the Body of Christ. Who is part of that Body? Where does the wider, integrated Body meet?

Our three-part discussion series will help us approach the discussion with grace about how God might break open ways in which our bodies could be the Christ’s, together.

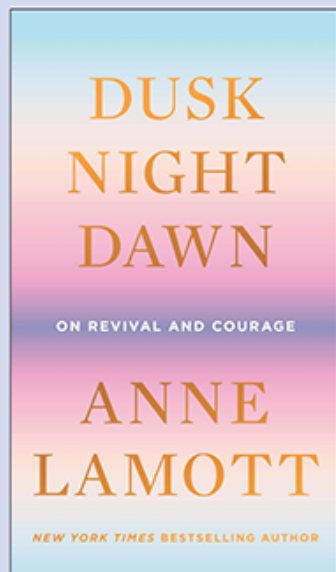



To encourage this discussion, after the film is viewed a select group of speakers will present about the disease and then will facilitate a Q & A session.
