




Beloved Community Initiative Announces Upcoming Events

Worshipping Online: New World, New Risks

Episcopal churches have leaned into the tectonic shift in worshipping brought on by the persistence of COVID-19. Online services allow congregations to reach people near and far, swelling congregations in both size and geographic diversity. Today, as we tiptoe out of the pandemic, cyber worshipping continues. However, this new frontier is not without hidden risks.

Reciting a poem or singing a song or hymn from a purchased hymnal is commonplace in churches. This is acceptable for in-person religious services protected by the Religious Services Exemption of copyright law; but the exemption does not cover streamed, podcast, or prerecorded services posted on the internet, because online services are broadcast beyond church walls.



Copyright law can be confusing. Fortunately, the Church Insurance Companies and Church Publishing Incorporated, two divisions of CPG, can help with the <u>copyright risk management fact sheet</u>, which contains FAQs and links to resources for licenses to reprint, podcast, and record hymns and songs. It also connects users to a customizable worship-planning tool available through Church Publishing and a resource for obtaining performance licenses for a library of 29 million songs.

Closing of St. Paul's, Monongahela

In late October, the vestry of St. Paul's, Monongahela, made the difficult decision to close at the end of this year. The parish's last service will be Sunday, December 26, at 11 a.m.


Vestry members cited St. Paul's financial status, dwindling membership, and a number of large property maintenance issues as primary reasons for the decision to close. Certainly, the pandemic has also contributed to the parish's recent difficulties. The Bishop's Office had been in close contact with the vestry of St. Paul's in the months leading up to its decision, and alternative outcomes were hoped for and explored. Now, the vestry and Bishop are following the process for the closing of a parish, as outlined in our diocesan canons (Canon XXV, Section 6).

St. Paul's became a parish of the Diocese in 1860, and we are grateful for its ministry to the city of Monongahela and its surrounding communities over the decades. We are also grateful to the current leadership of St. Paul's, who have been faithful to the parish throughout its recent challenges. We know that their decision to close the parish was a difficult one – one that was not made lightly, nor without a great deal of prayer.

At the end of the year, the property of St. Paul's will come under the stewardship of the Diocese, and its future will be assessed.

Please keep the people of St. Paul's in your prayers, and pray, too, for the continued and renewed witness of Christ's Church in Monongahela and throughout our communities.









Episcopal Cottage of Chautauqua Seeks Hosts for the 2022 Season



Save the Date: Absalom Jones Day Celebration

A Note from the IRS: Beginning Jan. 1, 2022, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (also vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be 58.5 cents per mile driven for business use, up 2.5 cents from the rate for 2021. The rate for miles driven in service of charitable organizations will be 14 cents per mile, unchanged from 2021.
