Diocesan Transitions

Appointments and Assignments

On February 15, **the Rev. Catherine Munz** began serving as Interim Associate Rector at St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon. She will continue in the role through June, providing coverage during the maternity leave of St. Paul's Assistant Rector, the Rev. Laura Di Panfilo, and the sabbatical of their Rector, the Rev. Noah Evans.

Beginning in March, the Rev. Brandon Cooper and the Rev. Deacon Paul Barker are serving as regular supply clergy at St. Paul's, Kittanning. Brandon+ continues to also serve the parishes of Christ Church, North Hills, and St. Michael's, Wayne Township.

Bishop Solak has appointed **Gloria Trevino** to the Commission on Race and Reconciliation. Gloria, a member of St. James, Penn Hills, is filling a vacancy left by **Darrell Powell**, who retired and relocated to North Carolina last year.



With the retirement of the Rev. Leslie Reimer, **the Rev. Neil Raman** has been named Senior Associate Rector at Calvary, East Liberty. Neil+ has served at Calvary for three and a half years and is president of the diocesan Standing Committee.

Recent and Upcoming Retirements

Eucharists Through the Centuries at Christ Church, North Hills

Have you ever wondered how Christians celebrated the Eucharist 100 years ago? 500 years ago? 1000 years ago? Or even as far back as the very early church?

At each of its Sunday services during Lent, Christ Episcopal Church, North Hills is using a Eucharistic liturgy from each of those time periods, beginning with the Anaphora of Hippolytus of Rome in the year 215, and continuing, each succeeding week, with Eucharistic liturgies taken from various historic periods, ending with the present-day on Palm Sunday. It is a veritable romp through liturgical history.



According to the Rev. Canon James Shoucair, rector of Christ Church, "The idea behind this is not to present these ancient liturgies as some sort of museum piece to be observed with detached curiosity, but to help us to enter into them as living forms of

worship that connect us both with the risen Christ as well as with the piety of those who have come before us in the faith."

A short video compilation will be available after Easter for those wishing to view a sampling of the liturgies.

This is the Psalm that is read at the closing of the Maundy Thursday service during the stripping of the altar.



Sign Up for "Sacred Ground" Small Groups



Sacred Ground is an important component of Becoming Beloved Community, the Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society.

Sacred Ground is a film- and reading-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 10-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

The Diocese of Pittsburgh's Beloved Community Initiative (BCI) is creating local small groups to study the *Sacred Ground* curriculum. This will allow parishes to work together in regions or across regions to begin their journey through this important topic of study. BCI will collaborate with trained leaders to organize "Sacred Ground" small group studies, either through zoom or in person.

Garden Grants are Available Again this Spring

The diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee (SJO) encourages each parish to consider creating or sustaining a church vegetable garden. This is a wonderful outdoor activity offering easy social distancing, fresh air, and much-needed fresh produce for local food pantries and neighbors. So grab those seed catalogs from your mailboxes, and start planning your planting strategy.



Once again in 2022, the SJO will offer grants to fund church garden initiatives. For the last eight years, the SJO has offered small grants to support the efforts of creating and sustaining parish-based vegetable gardens.

The SJO is able to fund these garden grants, in part through donations from the Outreach Commission of St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon, Women of Calvary. East Liberty, and private individuals. Parishes or individual desiring to donate to this effort should contact <u>Canon Kathi Workman</u> in the diocesan office, or <u>Marianne Novy</u>, chair of SJO.

Applying for a garden grant: These grants are intended to support Episcopal parishes and organizations in the diocese to create new vegetable gardens or to support existing gardens. The application, with complete submission instructions, <u>is available in Word format here</u>.

Mailed applications must be postmarked by March 24, and electronic submissions (preferable) are due by March 28. Any questions regarding eligibility can be directed to <u>Marianne Novy</u> or <u>Pat Eagon</u>, the garden grant coordinator.
