This past year has allowed the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh to delight in multiple new beginnings! On June 26, 2021, the jubilant peal of the bells of Trinity Cathedral reflected the far-reaching joy felt by so many at the announcement of the election of your new Bishop. In August, you celebrated an inevitable time of transition with Bishop Dorsey and his wife Betsy, while mutually looking forward to the possibilities that the next chapter of your respective journeys would entail. Then, on November 13, 2021, Scott and I, along with our family and friends, and together with you and with the members of our Church at large and with God's great throng of witnesses, celebrated with joy and gratitude the day of my consecration at Calvary Church.
