Safe Church Training for Sunday School Teachers



With September comes the start of a new Sunday School year. Please remember that all Sunday School teachers must complete the Episcopal Church's Safe Church, Safe Communities training. This training is available at no cost online via the Praesidium Academy website.

For access to the training, complete and submit the registration form found here: <u>Safe Church, Safe Communities Registration - Formstack</u>. After doing so, you will receive an email inviting you to create a learner account on the Praesidium Academy site, as well as a separate email listing the courses that you will need to complete. (These emails are not auto-generated; please allow several days for processing.) Each course is quite short, normally taking between 10 and 20 minutes to complete.

This training should be completed every three years to keep fresh your knowledge of Safe Church principles and practices.

Child abuse and criminal history clearances should also be obtained and renewed every five years. (For information on required clearances, click here: <u>Clearances (pa.gov)</u>.) Evidence of completed training and clearances should be kept on file at your parish.

Our Washington County parishes – St. Thomas' in Canonsburg and St. David's in Peters Township – have partnered with RIP Medical Debt to forgive debt portfolios in western PA, eastern Ohio, and northern West Virginia.
