

The five Episcopal bishops in Pennsylvania recently issued a letter about gun violence in the state along with ways to help curb the growing problem.

Lenten Quiet Day in Johnstown

St. Mark's Episcopal Church, 335 Locust Street, downtown Johnstown PA, is hosting a Lenten Quiet Day in-person and via Zoom on Saturday, March 18, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

A Quiet Day is a period of respite when time is set aside to be quiet, spend time with God, and refresh your spirit for the days ahead. Quiet Days



frequently are held during Advent and Lent. Though the structure of the event remains the same from year to year, the topic differs for each event. The topic of our 2023 Lenten Quiet Day is "The Great Litany."

The event consists of alternating periods of meditation and quiet time followed by final prayers and a vegetarian lunch. During quiet times you can engage in relaxing activities, read books available in the Parish Hall or find a quiet spot in the church to read or meditate.

Participants are asked not to talk until after final prayers.

These last couple of years, with the continued threat of Covid and isolation, have been difficult for everyone. But Spring is coming, never mind what that darn groundhog said!

The diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee (SJO) encourages each parish to consider creating or sustaining a church vegetable garden. This is a wonderful outdoor activity offering easy social



distancing, great fresh air, and much-needed fresh produce for local food pantries and neighbors. So grab those seed catalogs from your mailboxes, and start planning your planting strategy.

Once again in 2023, the SJO Committee will offer grants to fund church garden initiatives. For the last nine years, the diocesan SJO Committee has offered a few (4-8) small grants each year to support the efforts of creating and sustaining parish-based vegetable gardens. In 2022, four established gardens received funding (St. Brendan's, Franklin Park; Holy Cross, Homewood; St. David's, Peters Township; and Shepherd's Wellness, Bloomfield) and two new gardens (Calvary, East Liberty, and All Saints, Brighton Heights).

While the SJO budget is very small, it is able to fund these garden grants, in part through donations from the Outreach Commission of St. Paul's (Mount Lebanon), the Episcopal Church Women, Women of Calvary (East Liberty), and private individuals.

Local Parish Medical Debt Campaigns Far Exceed Expectations

The results continue to amaze. Over \$40,000 raised. Nearly \$9 million in medical debt forgiven. More than ten thousand individuals given relief.



Three parishes – St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon; St. Thomas, Canonsburg; and St. David's, Peters Township – partnered

last year with <u>RIP Medical Debt</u>, a non-profit that buys large quantities of debt at a steep discount and then erases that debt with no further obligation or consequence for the individuals who benefit.

In October, <u>St. Thomas and St. David's reported that their joint campaign</u> resulted in \$1.68 million in debt forgiveness among 1,615 recipients in western Pennsylvania, eastern Ohio and northern West Virginia.

At about the same time, St. Paul's was wrapping up its fundraising for its own campaign, going several thousand dollars beyond a \$15,000 donation target and then receiving an additional \$15,000 matching gift from an anonymous parishioner.

RIP recently informed St. Paul's that it had completed the purchase of medical debts that could be erased through the parish donation. The funds were used to abolish \$7,197,077 in debts across the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
