Laundry Love events being held in Blairsville

St. Peter's Episcopal Church is back to having in-person Laundry Love events from noon to 2:30 p.m. every second Sunday at the E&F Forge Laundromat in Blairsville.

Laundry Love is a national initiative that was founded over 40 years ago on the West Coast and designed to assist low/no income families with their laundry needs. Kathy Hughes Baird presented the idea of Laundry Love to the congregation of St. Peter's Episocpal Church around seven years ago.

"At the time, we were donating as a church to several organizations," she said, "but we had no hands-on mission."

So they started hosting Laundry Love events on the second Sunday of each month for a few hours. The church, thanks to funding from the Episcopal Dioceses of Pittsburgh and donations from organizations and other churches within the community, are able to provide quarters, laundry detergent and dryer sheets to those who show up.

"But most importantly

of the people you pass on the street," she continued. "I leave there and realize I have hardly any problems at all."

Baird explained the challenges that their mission faced during the mass social restrictions of COVID-19.

"We relied on texting some of the regular families that come each month and if they needed their laundry done, we would deliver quarters and detergent to their house depending on the amount of loads."

The group was also able to use donations from the Blairsville Alliance Church's Vacation Bible School program, in which the kids prepared sandwich bags filled with a laundry pod, dryer sheet and Bible verse.

"We got them before the pandemic and ended up saving them, they were so pretty," Baird said, "but then we were able to distribute and use them once the pandemic hit. It worked out well."

They just recently kickstarted in-person events again.

a woman who had shown up for the event asked if he could start bringing communion to them at the laundromat, too.

"So now we do that!" said Baird. "Sometimes we have more people in the laundromat than we do in church."

"Every church is part of the community," she said. "I believe that a church is not a place with walls around it. Whether or not people go to church, you serve them. Especially those in different situations than you."

"You can't know your

community unless you know all the different types of people that live in it," she said. "The kindness and generosity of the people we meet there is wonderful. Everyone is human; it's wonderful to learn about the people you don't normally associate with. We tend to fear them or be hesitant. We shouldn't.'
