






"St. Nicholas is one of my favorite characters from church history and he's kind of misunderstood as Santa Clause. So, where does the St. Nick mythos come from?

He was originally a bishop in Smyrna, he served in present day Turkey and Syria, and he was a brilliant theologian who was a defender of the faith in the 400s. But he was known mostly for giving in secret. In fact, the young ladies of the town who were from poor families didn't have the financial means to get married because you had to produce a dowry to be married and, if they were unmarried, they oftentimes fell into

houses of ill repute and became prostitutes. But what he would do is gather up money and every night he would give them a dowry so they could get married and escape that life.

And it goes beyond that, but he was always about what Jesus often commended us to do which is to give in secret. No big foam rubber checks. Stop with the newspaper articles. When you're giving, do it because Christ is alive in your heart and you want to help others not because you want notoriety for it. And that's the central theme of this Abbey is 'we're here to be a quiet presence of Christ in a dark world and we will do the



things that we do that need done mostly in secret; we're not asking for attention. We want to be good givers."
