#### **Joining Diocesan Staff**

**The Rev. Canon Joann Saylors** will join the diocesan staff on April 1, 2025, as Canon to the Ordinary for Mission, Vitality, and Administration. She is relocating from Houston, Texas, where she has served as Canon for Mission Amplification for the Episcopal Diocese of Texas.



In conjunction with Canon Joann's arrival, **Canon Kim Karashin** will assume the role of Canon to the Ordinary for Transitions and Clergy & Congregational Care.

#### **New Call**

**The Rev. Chuck Weiss** began serving as Interim Rector at Christ Church, North Hills, on March 1. He is returning to parish ministry on a part-time basis after

retiring in June 2023. Chuck remains canonically resident in the Diocese of Delaware, where he served prior to returning to Pittsburgh.

#### **Ended Calls**

**The Rev. Catherine "Cat" Munz** concluded her time as Interim Priest at Church of the Nativity, Crafton, at the end of February. She served in that capacity since July 2024. #### **Garden Grants Available Again this Spring**

These last few days of February and early days of March have been either a warm sunny prom-ise or a chilly blast with snowflakes flying. What to expect, it's Pittsburgh! Punxsutawney Phil predicted an late spring, but groundhogs have been known to be mistaken after being yanked early in the morning from a cozy warm den. We can only have faith that spring is on its way!





Once again, the diocesan Social Justice and Outreach Committee (SJO) encourages each par-ish to consider creating or sustaining a church vegetable garden. Gardening is is a wonderful outdoor activity offering easy socialization, great fresh air, and much-needed fresh produce for local food pantries and neighbors. So grab those seed catalogs from your mailboxes, and start planning your planting strategy. Once again in 2025, the SJO Committee will offer grants to fund church garden initiatives. For the last ten years, the diocesan SJO Committee has offered a few (4-8) small grants each year to support the efforts of creating and sustaining parish-based vegetable gardens. In 2024, five

established gardens received funding: St. Brendan's (Franklin Park), Holy Cross (Homewood), St. David's (Peters Township), Shepherd's Wellness (Bloomfield), and All Saints (Brighton Heights).

#### **ECW Spring 2025 Grant Applications Available**

The Diocese of Pittsburgh's Episcopal Church Women (ECW) will be making outreach grants in the Spring.

The ECW particularly seeks to support hands-on ministries that help children, adults and families in need of assistance with food, nutrition, health care, housing, education and counseling.

The grants are primarily designed for ministries within the diocese and with the goal of even distribution across all districts. It is hoped that these small grants will enable the continuation of existing



ministries on the local level. However, the ECW will continue its policy of also awarding grants to some national and international ministries such as Episcopal Relief & Development.

#### **ECW Spring 2025 Scholarships Available**

The Episcopal Church Women established the Memorial Membership Fund to aid students with educational grants. The fund was begun in 1927 to be used for two missionary training scholarships. In the 94 years of its existence, the scope of the fund has widened to include nursing, theology and other humanitarian fields of study.



Funds are raised through gifts from individuals or groups in memory of a loved one or friend. This money is invested and the interest used for the granting purposes.

#### Each applicant must:

- be an Episcopalian in good standing (active) in a parish in the Diocese of Pittsburgh,
- have completed one year of college or the equivalent,
- be pursuing education in either church or humanitarian related fields,
- submit an application, including a letter stating goals and need, and
- submit a reference letter from their parish priest.

The Memorial Membership Committee will consider each request based on individual need and circumstances. Scholarships are completely unencumbered and may be used as needed to aid the recipient in achieving their educational goals. Each eligible applicant is able to apply once a year for three years.

What is Advocacy Day? Advocacy Day is an annual day of visibility and advocacy in Harrisburg, where partners and constituents from across the commonwealth gather to meet with legislators, wear orange shirts and be a visible presence throughout the capitol, and hold a rally, filling the steps of the capitol.

This year we will be advocating for Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPOs), Secure Storage, Universal Background Checks, Lost & Stolen Firearm Reporting, Ending Untraceable "Ghost Guns" and 3-D Printed Firearms, and \$80 million in Community Violence Intervention (CVI) funding in Gov. Shapiro's FY25 Budget.


